OPERATION ROLLING THUNDER



SAVANNAH CHATHAM POLICE METROPOLITAN

The Savannah-Chatham Metropolitan Police Department and Governor's Office of Highway Safety are stepping up enforcement to drive down the number of traffic-related deaths, and injuries on Chatham County roadways. The metropolitan area now ranks fifth in the state for fatal traffic crashes. The numbers continue to climb despite local enforcement efforts, with 14 deaths to date compared to 10 last year.

That's why SCMPD Chief Michael Berkow and the Traffic Unit have enlisted help from the Governor's Office of Highway Safety with Operation Rolling Thunder. In

response to the request, the Governor's Office of Highway Safety formed the first THUNDER TASK FORCE; a uniquely qualified contingent of officers from across the state, who are committed to saving lives on Georgia's roadways. The state and local entities will unite locally for an intense and sustained wave of enforcement to reduce crashes in the Savannah/Chatham area.

"We spend a great deal of resources focusing on crime-reduction strategies to protect our citizens. Clearly, as we now rank fifth in the state for traffic deaths, motorists using our highways are in need of equal protection,"

Berkow said. "The crashes that seriously injure, maim, and claim the lives of motorists and pedestrians typically result from traffic violations and bad driving. Our goal is to reduce highway tragedies that result from violations through high visibility and vigorous enforcement."

The GOHS will lend the resources to this local reduction effort as part of their statewide campaign to promote safer highways. The

extra manpower from the Thunder Task Force will beef up enforcement in the metro area with more than 50 additional officers.

The state and local law enforcement contingency will descend on our roadways starting April 3, with road checks and concentrated patrols lasting through June. The operation will roll throughout all of SCMPD's six precincts.

Motorists who are impaired, driving recklessly, not wearing seatbelts, speeding, or committing other traffic infractions that result in crashes will be the focus of Operation Rolling Thunder.

CRIMESTOPPERS IS WORKING WITH THE COMMUNITY TO SOLVE CRIME

CrimeStoppers of Savannah Chatham County is a non-profit organization that works with law enforcement, the media, and the community to bring criminals to justice. Concerned community members can call into CrimeStoppers with information on crimes occurring in their city/county. The information is entered into a report which is then forwarded to the appropriate law enforcement agency. To protect the callers' identity a code number is used. If there is an arrest based on that particular tip, the caller will receive a cash reward up to \$2500. The reward funds are raised solely from donations and fund-raisers, and are not generated through the use of tax dollars. Annual fund-raisers such as the Boston Butt sale and the Azalea Run (formerly Race

Against Crime), and contributions from third parties helps CrimeStoppers raise the money necessary to continue paying cash rewards to callers. The Azalea Run is being run May 12, 2007 and you can register by going to the CrimeStoppers website (www.SavannahChathamCrimeStoppers.org)

On September 11, 2001, Mr. Cacchioli rescued many from Tower #1 of the Trade Center. Later that day, the Youth Commission visit Madison Square Garden to watch the New York Knicks take on the Seattle Supersonics. On Wednesday, March 7, 2007, the Chatham County Youth Commission appeared on the NBC Today Show and visited the World Famous Apollo Theater in Harlem before returning to Washington, DC to tour XM Radio Studios.



The Chatham County Youth Commission represents the very best of youth from Chatham County public and private high schools and community organizations. They have received national attention as being one of the best initiatives that involve youth in government and politics. In 2001, the Youth Commission was invited to Washington to meet with Secretary of State Colin Powell. The Chatham County Youth Commission has started similar organizations in Fulton County (Atlanta), GA; Alachua County (Gainesville), FL; Savannah Youth Council, and Prince George's County, MD.

NEW VACCINE REQUIREMENTS: IS YOUR CHILD UP TO DATE?

Vaccine requirements have been expanded for children in Georgia to better protect them against many diseases. The Coastal Health District is working to educate parents, schools and daycares about the new requirements, which go into effect July 1, 2007.

The Georgia Department of Human Resources Board recently approved the additions,

following the recommendations of several physician advisory committees. The new requirements will affect all children attending childcare, Pre-K, Head Start and school facilities.

The changes include:

A 2nd dose of Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine and a 2nd dose of Mumps vaccine (or laboratory proof of immunity) for children entering kindergarten, 6th grade, or students entering a Georgia school for the first time in any grade;



The Hepatitis A vaccine (or laboratory proof of immunity) for children born on or after January 1, 2006 who are enrolled in school or child care facilities; and

The vaccine to prevent pneumonia for children under 5 years of age who are enrolled in childcare centers, Pre-K or Head Start.

The Georgia Immunization Program has always followed the recommendations of the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). The ACIP meets regularly to discuss and evaluate vaccine use and issue recommendations. "Vaccines are critical in preventing the spread of disease," says Marianne Pappas, Immunization Coordinator for the Coastal Health District. "These new requirements make Georgia's immunization rules even stronger, and our children will benefit."

Children can get vaccinated at their doctor's office or their county health department. Parents may contact their doctor or health department for more information about requirements specific to their child.

SAVANNAH - CHATHAM COUNTY DRUG COURT

Established in October, 2001 under the jurisdiction of Superior Court, Eastern Judicial Circuit.

Currently serving 78 clients; YTD enrollment = 201; graduates = 47; terminations = 75; retention rate = 61%. Of the 47 graduates, only 3 have been rearrested for felony drug charges, 4 for misdemeanor traffic offenses and 1 for contempt of court. A 85% success rate among graduates.*

Funding Sources: Department of Human Resources Regional Mental Health Board, Byrne Grant, Drug Abuse Treatment and Education Fund, Chatham County, Council of Superior Court Judges, Judicial Council of Georgia.

Target Population: Adults. Only non-violent offenders as defined by the Federal government are accepted. Program Capacity at current funding levels: 75-100.

Methods of Entry: Referral from Probation based on defendant's violation of Probation requirements and known drug addiction or through a negotiated plea.

Program provides much more intensive monitoring and supervision than traditional probation. Sanctions and Incentives are used to modify addictive and criminal behaviors. Research literature supports effectiveness of coerced treatment for drug offenders

Program consists of a 24-month Intensive Outpatient treatment program where participants must:

- attend group counseling 4 times a week & individual counseling as required
- attend 3 AA or NA meetings per week
- attend Court once per week
- submit to random drug screens
- be employed full-time
- earn a G.E.D.
- perform 80 hours of community service
- pay \$1000.00 toward the cost of treatment
- be current in all restitutions and Child Support obligations

Collateral services are provided to address needs such as stable housing

and family counseling. A mandatory monthly leisure activity is designed to help participants learn sober leisure skills to occupy the time that was spent in illicit activities.

Benefits to the community include:

Direct cost of treatment (approximately \$13.00 per day) is cheaper than the direct cost of incarceration (approximately \$45.00 per day)

Indirect benefits:

- Crime rate is reduced (it is estimated that 70% - 80% of all crime is drug related)
- Offenders pay taxes and spend their earnings in our community
- Reduction of burden on indigent health care system
- Reduction in need for and cost of other social services
- Benefits are spread to families and neighborhoods.

The CrimeStoppers Focus series is another way to remind citizens about CrimeStoppers and look behind the scenes of the criminal justice system. Since 2005, WTKS 1290 AM hosts the CrimeStoppers Focus radio program every Saturday and Sunday at 2 PM. Several months after the radio program made it debut the CrimeStoppers Focus television series started production with the help of Pete Nichols the Public Information Coordinator for Chatham County. The show can be seen on both Comcast channels 8 & 16. In October of 2006, the CrimeStoppers Focus television series won the 3CMA Silver Circle Award for best regularly scheduled program in our demographic.

Through presentations made by CrimeStoppers staff, and the coopera-

tion of the news media, CrimeStoppers makes its name known to the public. Presentations are given to youth groups and other miscellaneous organizations to help raise awareness of the program. Every Thursday, Demery Bishop appears on WSAV's Coastal Sunrise to present the fugitives of the week. CrimeStoppers Most Wanted television program produced by the City of Savannah can be seen on Channel 8 every week reminding citizens of fugitives that the police need to apprehend.

In 1999, CrimeStoppers partnered with the United States Attorney's Office in the Southern District of Georgia to become the media partner for the Project Safe Neighborhoods/Project Ceasefire program. This program is designed to alert citizens of who is allow to possess a firearm under federal law. The popular slogan that can be seen through out the Southern District is "HARD TIME FOR ALONG TIME. FELONS WITH GUNS DO TIME."

CONSTRUCTION APPRENTICE PROGRAM DELIVERS WIN FOR GRADUATES AND HOMEBUILDERS

"The program benefited me in several ways—ways that I could never imagine. I am so thankful to know that I can finally say that I have a found a trade where I look forward to going to work in the morning", commented Mr. Carlos Fields, a graduate of the Construction Apprentice Program in Chatham County. Mr. Brad Murphy of Hallmark Homes, and a member of The Home Builders Association of Greater Savannah, cited the apprenticeship portion of the curriculum as "Beneficial to the sub-contractor, while allowing good experience for the worker."

The Construction Apprentice Program, sponsored by The Home Builders Association and initiated by the Chatham County Commissioners last year, gives adults interested in the construction trade the opportunity to learn from professional contractors during the field apprenticeship portion of the curriculum. Step Up Savannah's Poverty Reduction Initiative, a partner in the Construction Apprentice Program, has connected citizens who are interested in learning skills in construction to the program. Daniel Dodd, Project Director of Step Up, commented, "The advantage to the program's participants lies in the opportunity to learn skills through both classroom instruction as well as on the job from professional home builders while earning a Construction Apprentice Certification that should result in jobs for all successful apprentices. Home builders have guaranteed job interviews to each successful apprentice." Savannah Technical College provides the training which includes classroom instruction in life skills to sustain success in the workforce, and building skills such as carpentry, framing, electrical assistance, wallboard and roofing. The last segment of the curriculum includes a field apprenticeship with builders from The Home Builders Association and associated subcontractors. The Home Builders provide sponsorship for the apprenticeships and guaranteed job interviews at the successful completion of the program.

Economic predictions indicate that construction and the building trades will flourish in the Savannah area for the next 15-20 years. The county remains committed to this program because of the shortage of skilled workers in the construction industry, and because of the high level of persistent poverty in Savannah and Chatham County.

In Chatham County, 20% of its citizens are without high school diplomas and below 8th grade levels in basic skills. Programs like the Construction Apprentice Program offer an opportunity for such individuals who have the interest and aptitude for construction work to focus on getting specific skills that will prepare them for jobs. Step Up's focus is empowering individuals to become economically self-sufficient.

The Construction Apprentice Program is a program for men and women, age 18 and above, who have an interest in learning skills that prepare individuals for a job in construction. All costs are underwritten by the Chatham County Commissioners. The Classroom Training is held in Neighborhood Training Centers such as St. Mary's Community Center. Interested participants should have a strong interest in working with their hands, using small tools, and be physically able to work in both indoor and outdoor settings in a variety of weather. Information sessions are held regularly. Contact Ms. Tara Sinclair, Construction Apprenticeship Program Director, at 604-9574. Ms. Sinclair joined the Construction Apprenticeship Program in March, bringing directly related experience in employment skills building and recruitment from her work at Union Mission.

Step Up Savannah's Poverty Reduction Initiative is an unprecedented effort to reduce the number of citizens living in poverty in our community. Savannah's business leaders, government, organizations, education, and individuals collaborate to foster economic self-sufficiency for all our citizens and increase economic benefits to all sectors of our economy. The City of Savannah provides a number of employee benefits including:

in addition, the Savannah-Chatham Metropolitan Police Department provides all basic equipment including uniforms, body armor, weapon and web gear, and footwear. Officers also receive an allowance for uniform cleaning.

Vacation & Holiday Leave

City employees earn 10 paid holidays per year. The vacation year runs from January 1 to December 31. Vacation is earned from the date of employment, but may not be taken during the first 6 months of service. Vacation time earned is based upon years of service with the City of Savannah.

1 - 4 Years Service - 12 Days Per Year
5 - 9 Years Service - 14 Days Per Year
10 - 14 Years Service - 18 Days Per Year
15 + Years of Service - 20 Days Per Year

Sick Leave

Sick leave is earned at the rate of 1 day per month. You may accumulate a maximum of 260 days of sick leave. Supervisors routinely assess employee sick leave usage.

Military Leave

If you are member of a National Guard or military reserve unit, you are permitted up to 18 paid days of military leave per year.

Qualifications

- 21 Years of Age
- US Citizen
- Valid Driver's License
- Vision Correctable to 20/20
- No Felony Convictions
- No Pattern of Misdemeanor Convictions or Traffic Violations
- Must not have a history of marijuana abuse or the abuse of any other controlled substance, legal or otherwise.
- Must submit to and pass a written exam, physical ability test, extensive background investigation, which includes a polygraph examination and a police officer profile assessment.

Testing & Processing

- Written Exam
- Physical Ability Test

After successfully completing the initial testing, your name will be placed on an eligibility register which is good for 1 year. A thorough background investigation, including a polygraph, will be conducted. Upon tentative selection by the Chief of Police, you will take a written exam administered by the Georgia Peace Officers

Standards and Training Council (POST), a medical exam, and a drug screen. Failure of any of these tests disqualifies the applicant. (Those who have completed a Georgia police academy are not required to take a written test or the POST entrance exam.)

Training

- Initial training consists of a 10 week state mandate academy. Most candidates will attend the Armstrong Atlantic State University Criminal Justice Training Center, located in Savannah. However, other academies around the state of Georgia may also be used.
- Upon completion of the academy, you will receive an additional 5 weeks of training at SCMPD.
- Your training will continue during your first assignment at one of the six Patrol Bureau Precincts. Here you will be assigned to a certified Police Training Officer for your "hands on" training, which will last about 15 weeks.
- Once you have completed field training, you will begin working solo. However, your training will continue through evaluations and follow-up training.
- The probationary period is for the first 12 months of employment with SCMPD.

Salaries

SCMPD officers work a 40 hour week, and are paid bi-weekly. The salaries listed are for police officer trainees with no prior law enforcement experience in Georgia. Applicants with at least 2 years prior law enforcement experience as a patrol officer may start at a higher rate of pay. Credit may be given for experience gained as a military police officer, or as a sworn officer with a law enforcement agency outside the State of Georgia.

The City of Savannah has a pay for performance plan which allows all city employees to earn up to a 2.5% pay increase. This pay for perform-

ance increase is over and above any cost of living increase which may be granted each year.

Promotions are based upon competitive examination. Advancement is earned without regard to race or gender.
